POPULAR ARTISTS HEADLINE MEADOW BROOK'S SPECIALS

The popular Wednesday night special attractions at Meadow Brook this summer will offer a blend of the best in contemporary trends for every popular musical taste, including pop, folk, blues and the "Nashville Sound."

*Rick Nelson and the Stone Canyon Band will lead off the series on July 4. Also appearing on the July 4 holiday bill will be Rufus Krisp backed by the 6-man Progressive Colorado Bluegrass.

*Helen Reddy, winner of this year's Grammy award for the best popular female vocalist, will appear on July 11 with special guest star folk-singer Steve Goodman.

*Bobby Goldsboro, long a favorite on the popular musical scene, will appear on July 18. Gallery, a fast-rising new group of 6 men who took "Big City Ruth Ann" onto the easy listening and popularity polls, will appear on the same bill.

*Mac Davis, superb songwriter and hit performer, will appear at Meadow Brook on July 25.

*Mary Travers, formerly of Peter, Paul and Mary, and now a successful solo performer in her own right, will appear on August 1.

*The Dave Brubeck Quartet featuring Gerry Mulligan on baritone sax will set toes to tapping on August 8.

*Folk troubadour John Sebastian will highlight the August 15 concert. John was the founder, singer, writer and director of the Lovin' Spoonful.

Tickets for the Wednesday night series will go on sale on June 11 at the Music Festival box office, Hudson's and Grinnell's. All Wednesday concerts are \$4, with unreserved seating only, lawn and pavilion. Ticket orders may be made by phone if charged to Bank Americard or Master Charge. For ticket information, 377-2010.

HUMAN RESOURCES INSTITUTE HOLDS AWARDS LUNCHEON

OU's Institute in Human Resources Development directed by James Schmidt, assistant professor of education, will celebrate its conclusion with a luncheon and awards program on Friday, May 18 at Meadow Brook Hall. Approximately 85 students, all em-

ployees of the Michigan Employment Security Commission, will have completed the three-year, thirty-semester-hour undergraduate program. The emphasis of the Institute has been upon the training of preprofessional helpers to work in manpower development programs.

ARCHAEOLOGICAL DIGS PLANNED THIS SUMMER

Investigations of a possible aboriginal "Stonehenge" site in Michigan and of the living habits of early settlers in the Pontiac-Rochester area will be conducted during an OU archaeological field session June 25-Aug. 15.

The program will train students in the actual techniques of archaeological excavation according to John Huner, instructor in anthropology. The course, AN 490, is open to OU undergraduates and to other interested individuals through consent of the instructor. The archaeological field session will include classroom and field work and cover such diversified techniques as cartography, fauna and flora analysis, archaeological theory and prehistory of the Great Lakes area.

The two summer "digs" will offer students a chance to grasp the techniques of excavating in layers and to appreciate the kinds of geographic and weather conditions actually faced by peoples who lived on the sites.
